


First Impressions

Designer Ryan Brown of Bravo's Flipping Out takes an FC reader's entryway from dull to dynamite with paint and a few inviting items.

THE CHALLENGE

"Ever since we bought the house about a year and a half ago, we've been stripping wallpaper, painting, updating lights and ripping up carpet," says Katie Gilson of Brookfield, Wisconsin, "We love our new home, but the entryway, with its miles of stairs and blank walls, has us stumped." Katle feels at a loss about how to make the area more welcoming and useful for her family-she and her husband, Dave, have two daughters ages 5 and 7-as well as guests.

"Please help us create an eye-popping entrance."

THE STRATEGY

To add personality and tie the space together with the adjacent living area, Ryan recommends a sophisticated sand color for the walls. "One of the things I noticed about the space was the overwhelming expanse of wood," he says. To break it up, Ryan suggests painting the risers and balusters white. A small half-circular table, topped with a catchall for items, at the foot of

the stairs makes a smart addition. "It's practical but narrow enough not to be in the way," he says. "And with a bold mirror, it also becomes a point of interest."

FINISHING TOUCHES

"Emphasize the height of the room with a statementmaking chandelier," says Brown. He suggests the Gilsons eventually replace the distracting track lighting on the landing with recessed lights. In the meantime, decorative flourishes can make a big difference. A gallery of family photos on the stairwell wall lends personality and leads the eye up the stairs. "Black-and-white photos are always a timeless choice," he says. "Keep the matting and framing consistent, such as white matting and black frames." Brown added a cushioned bench, which fills the space under the stairs and offers a convenient spot to sit. Top it all off with a few extras such as throw pillows in coordinating colors.
